MA Political Theory

(One Year Full Time or Two Years Part Time)



Introduction

Studying Political Theory means reflecting on and evaluating political activity and institutions. Such systematic thinking about politics is indispensable to understanding and participating in the life of our own state and a newly global world. Students examine the moral dimension of politics, exploring concepts such as justice, freedom, inequality, democratic participation and issues such as human rights, immigration, and climate change; informed by both contemporary political thinkers and the history of political thought.

Students also investigate more immediate policy issues of concern to governments, the media, civil society groups and individual citizens. Students acquire the ability to uncover creative ways forward in situations of conflict, inequality and global change. A wide range of specialisations are available to enable students to select areas where they wish to develop their expertise. The course structure offers students the option to undertake an internship to develop their professional skills.

Programme Highlight

This programme aspires to allow students become specialists in critical thought and reflection on key issues in political theory, capable of engaging with cutting edge philosophical debates and practical applications thereof in the realm of practical politics.
