Introduction

Urban design lies at the interface architecture and urban planning, with both disciplines contributing contrasting but complementary approaches to urban design theory and practice. The delivery of this master's programme draws on the distinct methodologies, professional perspectives and pedagogies of both architectural urban planning the school. Career Opportunities

The MSc Urban Design and Planning is aimed at graduates from related disciplinary and professional backgrounds wishing to specialise in urban design and planning. The programme is therefore designed to train, mentor and support graduates in developing their specialist knowledge and understanding, along with transferable skills and tools, for careers related to the field. These include roles in the public, private and community sectors, including planning and urban design consultancies, local authorities, development firms, regeneration companies, environmental and other NGOs, as well as research and teaching.

Applicant Profile

- Applicants must hold a primary degree with minimum upper second class honours award (NFQ level 8) or international equivalent in planning, architecture or landscape architecture. Applications from graduates with a degree in another related subject area will also be considered, including geography, engineering, property economics, and surveying.
- Applicants whose first language is not English must also demonstrate English language proficiency of IELTS 6.5 (no band less than 6.0 in each element), or equivalent.
