

MA/MSc Gender, Politics & International Relations

(One Year Full Time or Two Years Part Time)



Introduction

The MA/MSc in Gender, Politics and International Relations is a one-year intensive course that prepares students for a career in research, policy, or advocacy in international organisations, governmental and nongovernmental bodies, or academia. It is designed to provide students with specialized, detailed and advanced theoretical and conceptual knowledge and understanding of gender, politics and International relations, based on current debates and controversies at the forefront of the field.

This programme investigates the ways in which gender is implicated in the structure, practice, and theorising of politics. The programme explores the ways in which gender identity impacts on individual and group interactions with the domestic political system and global politics. It also recognises that national and international political structures are gendered and that this effects power relations, political behaviour, and public policies.

Programme Highlight

Gender is a fundamental aspect of both the international and domestic political systems.

This programme facilitates students to become specialists in understanding how gender shapes both individual and group interactions with politics on the national and global level.

- A primary degree with at least Second Class Honours Grade 1 (2H1). 2H1 is equivalent to 60 percent, B minus or 3.08 GPA - in American system: B or 3.00 GPA.

- Applicants whose first language is not English must also demonstrate English language proficiency of IELTS 6.5 (no band less than 6.0 in each element), or equivalent.
