Introduction

The MSocSc in Social Work, Welfare and Justice is designed for practising social workers interested in refining their analytical and management skills through post qualifying studies, and anyone who wishes to pursue research careers in policy making and analysis in the fields of social policy and social justice.

The programme focuses on a range of topics of relevance to policy makers and practitioners. In recent years, the work environment for social work practitioners is becoming globalised.

In addition, social justice and equality issues are an increasingly prominent concern in the social scientific research.

The Programme provides a range of learning opportunities across a wide range of topics, including: housing, health and social care, drugs and alcohol in the community, theory and practice in social work, gender equality, environment, migration, family and social protection.

Programme Highlight

This new programme enhances the School's existing portfolio of postgraduate taught offers, including our MSc in Equality Studies, Professional Masters in Social Work and MA in Gender Studies that are widely recognised in Ireland and internationally. Our School also contributes to the Master of Public Policy, which is hosted by the College of Social Sciences and Law, and also to the MSc in Child Protection and Welfare shared with the Schools of Medicine and Nursing and Midwifery.

Applicant Profile

- Applicants should have a minimum of a 2.2 honours degree or international equivalent at bachelors level.
- Applicants whose first language is not English must also demonstrate English language proficiency of IELTS 6.5 (no band less than 6.0 in each element), or equivalent. (A Duolingo Test of English (DET) score of 110 will be accepted for this year's applicant.)
