


MSc Equality Studies

Introduction

The MSc in Equality Studies offers a unique opportunity to examine equality and social justice issues from a range of perspectives and disciplines. The programme was designed for those who wish to develop an interdisciplinary understanding of inequality issues and explore strategies for change. Topics covered include economic, racial and gender and sexuality based forms of inequality, as well as key areas such as education, labour market policy and housing.

The programme combines research, theories and evidence drawn from across the social sciences with contemporary ideas and activism

in the area of social justice, drawing on insights from intersectional approaches to social change.

Drawing students from across the globe, the course emphasizes the relationship of theory to practice with a view to bringing about positive social change. Students also gain from undertaking engaged academic research, which includes researching and designing an equality-related intervention or action. The classroom environment is student-centred and participatory, with a focus on discussion, participation and engagement.

Programme Highlight

The MSc in Equality Studies is unique in Europe in the way it links research, theory and practice to challenge inequality. Our programme provides a holistic and multidisciplinary understanding of inequality and how to overcome it.

The UCD School of Social Policy, Social Work and Social Justice is widely respected for its research on equality and for its active engagement with social movements and civil society to bring about egalitarian change.
