<strong> Autumn, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> This course examines the institutional structure of the state which is set out by the Constitution. <strong> Spring, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> This course considers how the Constitution of Ireland protects fundamental rights and the relationship of these rights to the State's obligations under the international human rights treaties to which it is a party. Examples of the fundamental and human rights that may be conside..



<strong> Autumn, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> The topics covered in this module will be:, Negligence;The Duty of Care; The standard of care; Policy considerations in negligence; Negligent Misstatement; Nervous Shock; Economic Loss; Omissions; Liability of public authorities; Professional negligence; Causation and remotenes..

<strong> Autumn, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> The course constitutes the first French law module in the BCL (French Law Programmes). It is designed to provide students with an Introduction to French Constitutional Law. It is complemented in stage 2 with the course French Public Law 2 which provides an Introduction to French ...



<strong> Autumn, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> This module introduces students to the law relating to the formation of contracts. Estoppel); Intention; Certainty & Formal Requirements; Terms of a Contract v Mere Representations ; Rules o...



<strong> Spring, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> This course will look at possible vitiating factors for a contract. <strong> Spring, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> General Introduction to the Irish Legal System (GIILS) acts as a critical introduction for students to the Irish legal system. Students examine the sources and hierarchies of laws in the Irish legal system within a rule of law framework. Common law, legislation, EU and internatio...



<strong> Autumn, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> This module introduces commerce students to the fundamental features of the Irish legal system and to some of the major pillars of Business Law. General legal principles such as precedent and statutory interpretation are covered, as are core aspects of substantive areas of Law



<strong> Autumn, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> This five-credit module introduces students to the skills and knowledge which are essential to the study of law, effective learning at university and professional development. Students will be given a solid foundation in the skills of legal research; reading and analysing legal



<strong> Spring, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> This module constitutes an introductory course to French Private Law in year 1 of the BCL Law with French Law and BCL/ Maîtrise programmes. It is designed to provide students with a good understanding of the main features of civil law. Substantively, the course falls into 3 secti...



<strong> Spring, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> This module is designed as an Introduction to EU law and Institutions and is not offered to UCD Law students enrolled in a four year BCL or BBL programme . <strong> Spring, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> This module acts as a critical introduction for students to the Irish legal system. <strong> Autumn, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> The aim of this module in Comparative Study of Law is to provide students with a general knowledge of the comparative approach for studying law. <strong> Autumn, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> This 5 credit module explores the relationship between law and society, in particular looking at questions of crime and criminalisation. <strong> Spring, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> This 5 credit module explores various different criminal behaviours. <strong> Spring, Level 1, Credits 5</strong> This 5 credit module introduces students to penology as the study of punishment in society. <strong> Autumn, Level 1, Credits 10</strong> This 10 credit module sets the foundation for studying criminology in two important ways. <strong> Autumn, Level 2, Credits 5</strong> This five credit module introduces candidates to the foundations of the Irish law of property. <strong> Spring, Level 2, Credits 5</strong> This 5-credit module builds on the knowledge and skills established in Property Law I. Students will acquire knowledge in property law and further develop their doctrinal, theoretical and analytical skills.

<strong> Autumn, Level 2, Credits 5</strong> This module begins by introducing the student to the general principles of criminal liability. It examines the nature of criminal (as distinct from civil) liability and considers the elements of crime including in particular the concepts of actus reus, mens rea and issues in caus...



<strong> Spring, Level 2, Credits 5</strong> This 5-credit, 12-week module builds on the Criminal Liability module (LAW41910). It continues the focus on substantive criminal law. On this module we will examine in detail the catalogue of criminal offences and the general defences which may apply in respect of those offence...



<strong> Autumn, Level 2, Credits 5</strong> The course constitutes the pendant of French Public Law 1 (Introduction to French Constitutional Law) in stage 2 of the BCL (French Law Programmes). It is designed to provide students with an Introduction to French Administrative Law. Substantively, the course falls into two main...



<strong> Spring, Level 2, Credits 5</strong> This module introduces the legal framework relevant for the arts, cultural, and creative sectors in Ireland and internationally. It examines how culture is defined in law, what aspects of culture and the arts are regulated, and how different areas of law have both positive and

ne... <strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This course addresses the fundamental legal principles which govern the relationship between banks, their customers and third parties in the retail banking context...



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 10</strong> This module will introduce students to company law and insolvency law. The module aims to equip students to identify company law problems which commonly arise in practice and to respond appropriately. The module will introduce students to the Companies Act and will train students...



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 10</strong> This module examines how contracts are formed and their express and implied terms. It explores why contracts may be invalid on the grounds of misrepresentati on, duress and undue influence. It examines circumstances which make contracts illegal unenforceable. <strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 10</strong> This module provides a general introduction to the main features of both Singaporean legal orders. It considers aspects of Singaporean law which are of particular relevance to businesses, including tort and employment law. ...



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 10</strong> This module will introduce students to the key principles of sales law in Singapore. In particular it will examine the definition of the contract of sale; the passage of risk and property; implied terms as to quality, description and sample; title disputes and the remedies availa...



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 10</strong> This module provides a general introduction to the main features of both Singaporean legal orders. It considers aspects of Singaporean law which are of particular relevance to businesses, including tort and employment law....



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module focuses on the history of the emergence of equity as a source of law with particular focus on modern equitable remedies and the specific conditions regarding their use today. A legal comparative approach is adopted in the teaching of this module with full considerati..



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This is the first of two modules examining the rules that regulate the admission of evidence in a court of law. These rules cover the gathering of evidence in advance of trial and its subsequent presentation in the courtroom. This course places particular emphasis on the struct...



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module provides an introduction to the purpose and nature of tax, and to the principles and policies of revenue law. It looks at the sources of revenue law (Constitution, European Convention of Human Rights, EU law, legislation), territoriality and the connecting factors be...



<strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This is the second of two modules examining the rules that regulate the admission of evidence in a court of law. This course builds on the "Evidence -Foundations" module and focuses on advanced topics within the Law of Evidence. The module begins with a detailed consideration o...



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> The relationship between employer and employee is based on a contract. This module is concerned with that contract, tracing the contract from its inception to its termination. The course begins by identifying a contract of employment. It examines the formation, enforceability and...



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> Jurisprudence spans over two millennia of history of people thinking about what law is and what purpose it serves. It examines approaches to law in diverse societies as ancient Rome, medieval Europe, Victorian Britain, Soviet Russia, Nazi Germany contemporary Ireland. The ...



<strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This course deals with the main areas of law which affect the daily working of all media - the law of defamation, the law of contempt of court and the legal protection of privacy and confidential information and broadcasting and press regulation. It examines those principles and ...



<strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module focuses on the rules relating to the creation and administration of trusts and the role which the trust plays in modern society. A legal comparative approach is adopted in the teaching of this module with full consideration of the leading Irish and English cases and ...



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> Judicial review is the individual's remedy for the correction of llegal action by public agencies or officers. Judicial review is also one of the most common legal processes in the superior courts. The remedy by way of judicial review is available only where the agency commits on...



<strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module begins by reviewing the principal remedy for illegal administrative action: judicial review. After examining the history of the judicial review process, it turns to practical bars to public law redress such as the law of costs. It surveys the extent to which the ind...



<strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> European Human Rights Law provides a detailed exploration on select rights contained within the European Convention on Human Rights (ECHR). Students will engage with key doctrinal underpinnings of ECHR law. Detailed engagement with key case-law of the European Court of Human Righ...



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module will examine Constitutional Law aspects to marriage, the family and members thereof. The module essentially involves an examination of marriage validity and the legal remedies available upon marriage breakdown. It will involve an in-depth examination of marriage valid...



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> Environmental law is fundamental to how society interacts with the natural world around it. This module will examine the key principles of environmental law, its underlying philosophies, and how it is applied, at national, European and international levels. It will trace the de..



<strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> Family law is a fascinating and dynamic subject that raises important issues of social policy. Historically and constitutionally, Irish law has only recognised one form of family - the marital unit. This module focusses instead on two alternative views of the family parent-chil...



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module involves the study of the promotion and protection of human rights under international law. It aims to provide students with a substantial grounding in the foundations of contemporary international human rights law (IHRL), with a particular emphasis on the Inter...



<strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module explores key theories of crime, including biological, psychological and sociological explanations of criminal behaviour. It examines both classic and recent criminological theories, investigating their origins, principal ideas and practical implications. ...

<strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module examines the regulation of commercial transactions. <strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> The course constitutes the last French law module in the BCL Law with French Law programme. <strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module examines how **EU** Competition Law operates in practice. <strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> In this module students will be given an overview as to courtroom etiquette and behaviour so that they know how to address the court and are aware of various formalities that surround appearing in and representing a client in Court.

<strong> Summer, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module offers students an opportunity to pursue independent research on an aspect of law that is of particular interest to them.

It is a 5-credit module that takes place over the summer trimester and is delivered in a hybrid and flexible manner. Students will devise their...



<strong> Summer, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This is a generic module descriptor that will cover different summer schools involving the School of Law. At present two US Law Schools, Fordham and Tulsa, offer such programmes and discussions are on-going with a number of US Law Schools about a bespoke programme offered at UCD



<strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module looks at how the law responds to private disputes which transcend national borders: eg cross-border contract litigation, torts committed abroad. This module will explore the three core elements of Private International Law: jurisdiction (when will an Irish court hear



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> The first part of this module examines the law and policy of the patent system.

Topics covered may include: the justification for the patent system, the framework of patent law, including the European Patent Convention and the proposal for a unitary patent package, the criter...



<strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module consists of a detailed examination of issues pertaining to trial by jury. It begins by placing the Irish jury in its historical and constitutional context. Examples of the topics which will be considered include aspects of jury history, the jury secrecy rule, jury mis...



<strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> Planning law has historically been controversial, politicised and adversarial in Ireland, making for a fascinating mix of law, policy and politics. This module will introduce students to core features of planning law, including: development; planning applications and decisions; a...



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module examines the legal regimes governing and produced by inter-governmen organisations. This includes a consideration of the legal and conceptual nature of such organisations. It seeks to discern unity, while recognising that each organisation has its individual legal



<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> This module is designed to look at the financial law of the European Union.

<strong> Autumn, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> Whilst Public International Law governs the legal relationships between sovereign states, International Economic Law is that area of Public International Law dealing with the trading relationships between states. <strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> An orthodox conception of statehood includes a presumption that states may determine who their own nationals are, and that while everyone has the right to leave any country, including her own, states may decide under what conditions to grant non-nationals rights of entry and resi...



<strong> Spring, Level 3, Credits 5</strong> Medical law is a module providing students with the opportunity to understand and examine the legal frameworks (tort law, constitutional law, human rights law, and professional guidelines) that govern the provision of healthcare in Ireland and internationally. <strong> Autumn, Level 4, Credits 10</strong> The course explores the internationalisati on of competition law in a globalising world. It examines different competition regime models. <strong> Spring, Level 4, Credits 10</strong> The module is concerned with trade mark law. The module will focus in particular on the development and operation of statutory systems of registration and infringement of trade marks. <strong> Summer, Level 4, Credits 30</strong> This module prepares students to independently research a graduate level dissertation in Law and/or Criminology. Students are introduced to various legal and criminological research approaches and methodologies. Training in legal research skills (such as academic honesty, locatin...



<strong> Autumn, Level 4, Credits 10</strong> This advanced level module critically examines how EU competition law governs particular actions of private market actors. It considers the rationale behind EU competition law and how this area of law fits in to the EU's economic order and philosophy. It explores and

critiques t... <strong> Spring, Level 4, Credits 5</strong> This module focuses on the law and practice of domestic arbitration, covering the arbitration agreement, the arbitrator, the arbitral process, the award, recourse against the award, and enforcement of the award....



<strong> Summer, Level 4, Credits 5</strong> This module focuses on the key skills required of arbitrators in terms of management of arbitral procedure....

<strong> Autumn, Level 4, Credits 5</strong> This module examines legal thought over the past two millennia of human history. Jurisprudence is a broad subject that explores what law is and what purpose it serves. This module will examine the works of persons from differing schools of thought on the subject of law and speci...



<strong> Spring, Level 4, Credits 10</strong> The majority of offenders cease to commit crime in early adulthood. This phenomenon, known as desistance from crime, is well-documente d in the criminological literature. Recently, there has been a growing interest in studying the mechanisms and contexts involved in the transitio...



<strong> Autumn, Level 4, Credits 10</strong> This module asks the question: what is the role of law in the governance of the EU?
